Subject: Forensic Psychology- BSCFS14305

Type of course: Major

| 1 | Case Study Analysis Provide students with a brief description of a criminal case (without revealing the psychological analysis). Ask them to analyze the behavior of the criminal based on psychological concepts such as personality disorders, motives, and cognitive biases. Students can write a one-page analysis of the criminal's psychological profile and then upload this on GMIU web Portal. | 10 |
| 2 | Eyewitness Reliability Experiment Present students with a written account of a crime witnessed by different people. Ask them to identify inconsistencies or possible sources of error in the witness statements, then write a brief analysis of how reliable they think each witness is and then upload it on GMIU web Portal. | 10 |
| | Risk Factor Identification Worksheet Provide a list of potential risk factors (e.g., family environment, peer influence, socioeconomic status). Ask students to categorize these risk factors into two columns—one for young offenders and one for adult offenders. They can then write a brief reflection on how these factors might differ between age groups and apload it on GMIU web Portal. | 10 |



| 4 | Application of Forensic Psychology: Civil vs. Criminal Proceedings Comparison Create two brief case scenarios—one civil (e.g., a custody dispute) and one criminal (e.g., a murder trial). Ask students to write a comparison, discussing how forensic psychologists would be involved in each case and the differences in their roles and assessments and then upload it on GMIU web Portal. | 10 |
