Sr. No	Active Learning Activities	Marks
1.	Freewriting Exercise + Story Starter Challenge Students must complete a 15-minute freewriting session on a random topic without stopping. They should then choose a story starter provided by the faculty and expand it into a 300-500 word short scene.	10
2.	Write a Short Story or Poem Using Poetic/Literary Devices students will write an original short story (800-1000 words) or a poem that incorporates at least three literary devices (such as metaphor, symbolism, alliteration, imagery, etc.). Upload the story/poem on the GMIU Web Portal along with a brief self-reflection (100 words) on how they applied literary devices in their writing.	10
3.	AI-Assisted Blog Post Creation Students will use a Generative AI tool (such as ChatGPT) to create an initial draft of a blog post on a topic of their choice. They must then refine, edit, and enhance it with their own creativity and unique voice. Publish the final blog post on a blogging platform (e.g., Medium, WordPress, or Blogger) and share the link on the GMIU Web Portal.	10
4.	The Rewrite Challenge Students will be given a poorly written or cliché-filled short story or scene. Their job is to rewrite the piece, improving its plot, dialogue, and characterization. They should also provide a brief summary of the changes they made and explain the reasons for their choices.	10
