Subject: History Of Indian Administrative System-MATHI13513

Rationale:

The study of India's administrative systems from ancient to modern times reveals the gradual evolution of governance. Early institutions like Sabha, Samiti, and Gana states show democratic traditions, while empires like the Mauryas and Guptas introduced centralized administration. The Sultanate and Mughal periods brought Persian-influenced governance, and Shivaji's Maratha rule developed a regional model. British rule replaced traditional systems with a centralized colonial bureaucracy. Post-independence, India adopted a federal structure with Union and State governments. Understanding these phases helps trace the roots of modern Indian administration.

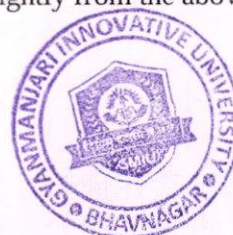
