### Prerequisite:

1	Comparative Analysis: Students have to write a comparative essay on the theories of Marx, Max Weber and Emile Durkheim and discuss their ideas on society, class and social change and upload it on GMIU web portal.			
2	Sociological Concepts:  Students have to choose a key concept from a classical sociologist (e.g., "anomie" from Durkheim or "social action" from Weber) and explain its relevance in contemporary society and upload it on GMIU web portal.			
3	Research Paper:  Students are required to create a case study examining a social issue (such as inequality or religion) through the lens of a classical sociologist's theories and upload it on GMIU web portal.			
4	Book Review:  Students have to read and review a major work by a classical sociologist (e.g., Marx's "The Communist Manifesto," Weber's "The Protestant Ethic and the Spirit of Capitalism"). Discussing its main arguments and its impact on sociology and upload it on GMIU web portal.			
5	Presentation: Students have to prepare a presentation on the life and contributions of the selected classical sociologist, highlight their major theories and their influence on modern sociology and upload it on GMIU web portal.			
6	Theory Study: Students have to study one theory of any one classical sociologist outside the subject and upload it on GMIU web portal.
