Subject: Land Laws including Tenure & Tenancy System – LAWLL13516

Type of course:

Prerequisite: Transfer of Property Act, 1882 – especially rules on sale, lease, and gifts of immovable property. Students have also Knowledge of Article 300A of Indian Constitution.

Rationale: This Law provide a **multi-disciplinary and practical foundation** that enables students to grasp land law not just as a set of rules, but as a **dynamic system** impacting property rights, governance, social equity, and development. Without this foundational knowledge, students may struggle to understand the **legal, historical, and socio-economic** dimensions that shape land legislation and its implementation.

Instructional Method:

The course delivery method will depend upon the requirement of content and the needs of students. The teacher, in addition to conventional teaching methods by black board, may also use any tools such as demonstration, role play, Quiz, brainstorming, MOOCs etc.

From the content 10% topics are suggested for flipped mode instruction. Students will use supplementary resources such as online videos, NPTEL/SWAYAM videos, e-courses. The internal evaluation will be done on the basis of Active Learning Assignment.
