Subject: Modern Poetry and Drama - BATEN15316

Type of course: Major (Core)

Prerequisite: NA

Rationale:

This course aims to familiarize students with modern poetry and drama by exploring significant literary movements, themes, and styles from the late 19th century to the contemporary period. Through critical reading and analysis, students will engage with works that reflect modernist experimentation, social and political commentary, and innovative dramatic forms.

Course Content:

1	Modernism and Literary Movements: Exploration of major literary movements such as Symbolism, Imagism, Surrealism, Dadaism and Stream of Consciousness: Introduction to major modernist writers like T.S. Eliot, Ezra Pound, W.B. Yeats, and Virginia Woolf.	12	20 %
2	Modern Poetry: Key Poets and Themes: Study of significant modern poets, including W.H. Auden, Sylvia Plath and Elizabeth Bishop. Themes of war, identity, alienation, feminism, and post-colonialism in poetry. Close reading and analysis of selected poems.	15	25 %
3	Major Modern Dramatists and Their Works: Discussion of major modern playwrights such as Samuel Beckett and Harold Pinter. Focus on existentialism, absurdism, and experimental theatre. Detailed study of plays like Waiting for Godot and The Birthday Party.	15	25 %
4	Contemporary Trends in Poetry and Drama: Examination of postmodern and contemporary poetry and drama, including performance poetry and experimental theatre. Works of Carol Ann Duffy, Derek Walcott, and modern dramatists like Tom Stoppard. How contemporary theatre and poetry reflect political and social issues.	18	30 %
